Welcome to our annual report! As Director of Library Services, it gives me great pleasure to share with you the extraordinary accomplishments and milestones that have shaped Teton County Library over the past year.

Fiscal Year 2023 felt busier than ever – we're calling it "the year it all came back," in part, because in-person programming returned, bringing after school children, lifelong learners, foreign policy afficionados, crafters, story timers, and even the Ruff Readers dogs back into our buildings.

Behind the scenes, a committee of staff and library stakeholders were also busy, first surveying the community and hosting community conversations, and then analyzing data and comments to create our new Strategic Direction. The mission and four top priorities spelled out by that plan have in turn provided staff inspiration for what comes next, as you'll see on these pages.

We also celebrated 85 years as Teton County's public library. In the spirit in which citizens called forth a free and accessible library in 1938, we embarked (along with several other county and town entities) on IDEA (inclusion, diversity, equity, and accessibility) training to ensure our Library serves everyone in the community.

To call attention to the special public-private partnership that operates under our roof, we've compiled a special flip sided report. On the next few pages, you'll read about the last year in Teton County Library world, while the flip side of the report will give you more of last year's story from the perspective of our newly merged partner organization, Teton County Library Foundation & Friends. Many people are unaware that taxpayer dollars fund about 86% of TCL's offerings and operations, and donations to TCL F & F bring an additional 14% (the colorful icing on the 85th birthday cupcakes, if you will). We hope you enjoy both sides of our report!

# THE STATS

#### A TALE OF TWO CARDS

When Moose patron Douglas Leen came to the front desk and told us his card needed to be renewed, he was making an understatement—it was the oldest card any of the current staff had ever seen, made of gold cardstock and handwritten, with number 397 on it. Doug estimated that he'd

been carrying it around since the 1970s. Even though the card had no expiration date on it, our software will not recognize a number that low, so we issued Doug a new green card that he'll be able to use in the

self-checker or to check out digital

materials.

A couple of months later, during National Library Card Sign Up Month, we debuted a new card design with a fiery graphic image inspired by the #UniteAgainstBannedBooks movement. When patrons sign up for a card, they can choose our traditional light green card or take a stand against censorship by



choosing the new "I Read Banned Books" card.

#### THE JOY OF COOKING

Our 22 in 22 Reading Challenge ultimately engaged 597 readers, who read more than 7000 books by year end. Alta Branch Manager Eva Dahlgren and Alta patron and volunteer Kathy O'Neil came up with their own twist on the challenge—to apply the challenge to cookbooks by cooking at least

one recipe each out of the books they chose.

The challenge proved life-changing in at least one way, as Kathy loves yogurt but not the plastic waste that comes with



buying it. Enter "Homemade Yogurt & Kefir" by Gianaclis Caldwell, whose recipes Kathy continues to use regularly. "We share a sweet tooth, so many of our choices involved baking," said Eva, whose favorite title from the year was "Pieometry" by Lauren Ko, which applies geometry into pie baking, as shown here in the photo of Eva and Kathy with two of their 22 creations.



#### TO GUADALAJARA AND BACK

We heard through surveys and comments that our Spanish language collection was lacking, both in content and in visibility, and made it an almost immediate priority to address both problems.

Two staff members, Pati Rocha and Stephanie Franco, were dispatched to the huge Guadalajara International Book Fair in November to see what improvements they could make in content. They met with booksellers and placed orders for both the youth and adult Spanish collections.

"We found books that would have been almost impossible to find through online sources," said Pati. "And now we have great connections to continue to build our collection."

Then the Spanish collection moved into a more prominent piece of real estate near the new books for easier browsing. Find ESL materials there too!

#### **BUILDING STRONG BUSINESSS**

Local entrepreneurs are some of our most regular visitors, using our study rooms for meetings and settling in to quiet corners to enjoy our free Wi-Fi, and now a consortium of state organizations are partnering in Wyoming Library to Business. Wonder Institute Recording Studio: Study Room 6 has been converted into a specialized space to produce polished audio and visual content for podcasts, YouTube videos, websites, and more, thanks to funding and expertise from the Wonder Institute. It's a professional atmosphere outfitted with high-quality audio and visual equipment for use by an individual or small group. Once your recording is done, visit the editing station in the computer lab to finish your project.

From paper flowers to mending clothing to sketching, we offered Creativebug classes and kits highlighting some of our favorite offerings from their large selection of online offerings. We supply the raw materials, and you bring your creativity.

You now have another choice when entering the building, thanks to the newly named **North Entrance** off the parking lot. This door had previously been limited to use by folks with mobility issues, but innovative thinking by our facilities team has made the door accessible to all.

Find fresh produce, dairy, pasta, peanut butter and more, free for the taking at the One22 satellite food cupboard in our lobby. The cupboard is restocked by volunteers and open during Library hours.

Like so many of our mid-town neighbors, we caught the e-bike craze! Our bright green Book E-bike makes appearances at the weekly Peoples Market and special events. Once on site, the box at the front of the bike opens to reveal all the books we have to give away to passersby. Stop by and say hi!

#### **NIGHT AT HOGWARTS**

A Night at Hogwarts, an event based on the Harry Potter book series specifically for ages 8-17, was such a highly anticipated event that the registration filled up in less than 7 minutes!



#### **PAGE TO THE PODIUM**

Page to the Podium provides intellectual and cultural learning experiences by inviting renowned authors to share their stories and perspectives with our community. When author Ta-Nehisi Coates was the library's guest author in April, registration for Page to the Podium filled in just an hour and a half.

Mr. Coates spoke onstage with local author Nina McConigley to a packed Center for the Arts theater, reading from his book *Between the World and Me* and discussing some of the social, political and cultural challenges facing our country. The author

also invited English students from Jackson Hole High School and Jackson Hole Community School to participate in a group discussion backstage where they talked about the author's work. Students asked questions about their role in raising awareness of social justice issues and about the craft of writing.

#### VITA

Volunteers prepared and filed 488 free tax returns for Teton County residents this year, a 26% increase over the previous year.

#### **AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAM**

The Library's Afterschool Program was back in person for the 2022-2023 school year! The Library partnered with Jackson Hole Children's Museum and offered drop-in programs and arts and crafts projects for students as they gathered in the library.

#### **FAMILY WORK AND PLAY STATION**

It's a desk. It's a playpen. It's the Family Work and Play Station in the Youth Wing. Caregivers can work at the desk and keep their little ones contained, safe, and happy in the connected playpen.

#### **MAKERSPACE**






